**7:30 PM PUBLIC HEARING: Ordinance D-25**; An Ordinance vacating an alley which runs east and west parallel to Hostetler Rd. and between 1.428 acre and 1.362 acre parcels and City Lots Number 3272 and 3742, Wayne County Parcels 59-02878, 59-02877, 59-02341 and 59-02128 in the City of Orrville, Ohio:

No public attended. This is a paper alley on the power plant property. Public hearing closed at 7:32.

Council President Vance called the council meeting to order at 7:32 p.m. The Orrville Ministerial Association's Pastor Brad Dews led prayer. The pledge was recited.

Roll call. Handwerk excused. All others present.

Council minutes of the regular meeting on July 7<sup>th</sup> were presented for approval. Lax motioned to approve those minutes; Davies seconds; all ayes; motion passes.

#### Committee Reports

Transportation – Shanklin: Committee met and toured the Lacy Service Center to discuss PCR (Pavement Condition Rating) with legislation tonight.

#### Administrative Reports

Mayor Plybon: Employee of the month is Chad Warne at the Power Plant.

We've recently enjoyed some great community events like the OHS All Class Reunion and the Arts Festival. Other local businesses and events are the Farmers' Market, softball games, the Rehm Pavilion performance, next Monday's Moonlight Swim at Orr Pool, and next month's City-Wide Yard Sales as we soak up the summer weather.

Safety-Service Director Wheeler: Officer Dan Sottosanti chosen as the Crisis Intervention Officer of the Year for Wayne and Holmes County. New park equipment was installed near the dog park; funded by the Wayne County Health Department Grant which also funds the farmers' market.

Finance Director Strimlan: April and May Fund Balance reports were distributed. Requested a motion to approve those reports subject to audit. Carr moved. Lax seconds. All ayes; motion passes. Investment report for 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter has been distributed.

#### Old business

**Ordinance D-25**, Squirrell moved that it be placed on second reading. Davies seconds. Ayes all; motion passes. **Ordinance D-25**; An Ordinance vacating an alley which runs east and west parallel to Hostetler Rd. and between 1.428 acre and 1.362 acre parcels and City Lots Number 3272 and 3742, Wayne County Parcels 59-02878, 59-02877, 59-02341 and 59-02128 in the City of Orrville, Ohio.

Discussion: This is a paper alley within the power plant property. This is to clean up property lines and plats. No impact to neighbors.

Squirrell moved that the rules, regulations, and statutes requiring the reading of an ordinance on three separate days be suspended. Shanklin seconded. Ayes all; motion carried. Squirrell moved that **Ordinance D-25** be adopted as read. Lax seconded. Ayes all; motion carried.

**Resolution 28-25**, Squirrell moved that it be placed on second reading. Lax seconds. Ayes all; motion passes. **Resolution 28-25**; A Resolution authorizing and establishing the Naming Rights Policy for the City of Orrville, Ohio.

Discussion: It has been discussed in committee. Will go to third reading.

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### New Business

**Resolution 30-25**, Squirrell moved that it be placed on first reading. Davies seconds. Ayes all; motion passes. **Resolution 30-25**; A Resolution authorizing the Board of Control of the City of Orrville, Ohio, to enter into a contract extension with Kimble Recycling and Disposal, Inc. for refuse collection and disposal and curbside recycling services; and declaring an emergency.

Discussion: Kimble contract in 2020 was a piggyback to Wooster's contract to get economies of scale in pricing. There was a 3-year option to extend. Contract expires at the end of 2025. Wooster is going with bi-weekly recycling. We are not as 60% recycle on a weekly basis. We will keep the same service level as we currently have. After 2 ½ years we will see if there is a piggyback option or go out to bid. Instead of using an average of the three years and billing that, we will bill the actual rate for this next contract. Residents can fill their tote and leave an additional 8 bags at the curb each week. Residents need to call for any additional pick up beyond the tote and 8 bags. You must call Kimble for any large item pick up and you receive one large item per month free. Any cloth covered furniture and mattress/box springs must be fully enclosed in plastic and taped shut. The city does have mattress bags available for purchase. ACE Hardware sells mattress bags as well. The 8 bags is just for trash. Recycling extra can be placed on top of the tote. Coshocton pays more than this contract with recycling every other week.

Squirrell moved that the rules, regulations, and statutes requiring the reading of a resolution on three separate days be suspended. Lax seconded. Ayes all; motion carried. Squirrell moved that **Resolution 30-25** be adopted as read. Lax seconded. Ayes all; motion carried.

**Ordinance E-25**, Squirrell moved that it be placed on second reading. Davies seconds. Ayes all; motion passes. **Ordinance E-25**; An Ordinance amending Section 931.07 of Chapter 931 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Orrville, Ohio, relating to the rates for garbage and rubbish collection.

Discussion: This is the ordinance to be able to charge the rates to our residents on a monthly basis.

Squirrell moved that the rules, regulations, and statutes requiring the reading of an ordinance on three separate days be suspended. Lax seconded. Ayes all; motion carried. Squirrell moved that **Ordinance E-25** be adopted as read. Shanklin seconded. Ayes all; motion carried.

**Resolution 31-25**, Squirrell moved that it be placed on first reading. Shanklin seconds. Ayes all; motion passes. **Resolution 31-25**; A Resolution authorizing the Board of Control to enter into a contract and/or contracts for the 2025 Asphalt Resurfacing Project in the City of Orrville, Ohio and declaring an emergency.

Discussion: Transportation Committee met at the Lacy Center last Monday to go over the updated PCR ratings. West Hill is the worst condition asphalt street followed by Apple Blossom and Sunrise Circle. A portion of Willard at the intersection will be completed. These are all near each other which should help with economies of scale. We will shoot for a larger section next year with OPWC, with no guarantee of OPWC funding. Many of our streets rate in the 90's and 100's. Go out for bid in the next couple of weeks. Award at end of August and construction in September. Most will be mill and fill with a little base work on Apple Blossom.

Squirrell moved that the rules, regulations, and statutes requiring the reading of a resolution on three separate days be suspended. Shanklin seconded. Ayes all; motion carried. Squirrell moved that **Resolution 31-25** be adopted as read. Lax seconded. Ayes all; motion carried.

### Good of the Order

Lax: The Legion has Family Day on August 9. Veterans breakfast at Mrs. J's on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesdays of the month. Legion buys. Flags and plaques are still in discussion for the park. Wheeler: No bids were received on the Depot Park project. Concerns were October 31<sup>st</sup> deadline with weather and it would cost them compensatory damages if it wasn't completed. We are back out for bid with leeway on completion date going into spring. Bid opening is the

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end of the month. They will be able to keep their crews busy in the winter but may be torn up a little bit longer.

Mayor: Thanked directors and council members for their dedication and hard work the first part of the year.

Squirrel: Thanked the Mayor for all the social media postings keeping everyone up on what is happening around Orrville.

Carr moved to adjourn. Davies seconds. Ayes all; motion carried.

Our next regular meeting will be Tuesday, September 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2025. Meeting adjourned at 8:07 pm.
